Impact of the CoViD-19 pandemic on consultation-liaison activity: changes in everyday clinical practice and work-related factors associated with the psychiatrist's need for seeking help.

Introduction and aim are below:

#### Introduction

On 11 March 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared the novel Corona Virus-19 Disease (CoViD-19) a pandemic, the virus being present in 160 nations and in all continents (WHO, 2020). Since then, the world has been experiencing an unprecedented public health crisis, with consequences not only for physical health but also for the mental health of the population. A particularly vulnerable group is health care professionals. From the very beginning, concerns arose with respect to the health outcomes of the pandemic on professionals working in health care facilities (Torales et al., 2000).

The CoViD-19 epidemic started in the last months of 2019 in China. The WHO Chinese Office informed the WHO of the first case of pneumonia of unknown origin in Wuhan on 31 December 2019. Following this, the WHO informed the world on 9 January 2020. The cause of this new type of pneumonia was soon recognized in a novel virus initially named 2019-nCoV, then called Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome Coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2), which causes the Corona Virus Disease (CoViD or CoViD-19, from the year of the dicovery, 2019) (WHO, January 2020; Xiang et al., 2020; Zhu et al., 2020).

SARS-CoV-2 is the seventh known virus belonging to the family of coronavirus (Zhu et al., 2020). The latter are RNA viruses that generally cause infections to the upper respiratoy tract, e.g. cold. Though CoViD may be featured by fever, cough, pulmonary involvment, the majority of cases seems asymptomatic. In the first cases identified in China, mean incubation time was 5 days (IC95%: 4-7 days), with the 95° percentile equal to 12.5 days (The Lancet, 2020).



Italy has been the first democracy and the first European study to face the epidemic. The first case was reported on 21 February 2020 (Mutti, 2020). In the following weeks, the virus quickly spread throughout the other European Member States. In all countries, the CoViD-19 epidemic led to a condition of uncertainty, fostered by the fear to be infected as well as to infect other people. Moreover, the epidemic has pointed out the co-existence of medieval strategies implemented to contain the contagion (eg., quarantine and lockdown) toghether with ultratechnological systems (e.g. intensive care units, the ability of deveoping vaccine in a very short time, etc.; Moscara et al., 2020).

The present study aims to describe the activity of Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry (CLP) Services throughout Europe during the SARS-CoV-2 pandemic. CLP (also known as psychiatry of the medically ill, liaison psychiatry, or psychosomatics) is a sub-specialty of psychiatry dealing with the interface between somatic and psychological disciplines. It is framed within the bio-psychosocial paradigm, which aims to a holistic approach to illness, rather than to a biomedical one (Engels, 1977; Diefenbacher & Burian, 2015; Ferrari et al., 2016). To the best of our knowledge, no similar studies have been carried out in this field. Yet, research pointed out that delirium, one of the main reasons for psychiatric referral within general hospitals, frequently occurs among people affected by CoViD-19, even when respiratory symptoms are not present (Baller et al., 2020). Also, pharmacological issues may stem out when people who receive psychopharmacological treatments are hospitalized due to CoViD-19. Finally, it is important to recognize early signs and symptoms of psychiatric disorders (e.g. depression or post-traumatic stress disorder) among patients hospitalized due to CoViD-19 who develop psychopathological impairments during hospital stay.

This study was carried out within the European Psychiatric Association Section (EPA) on Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry and Psychosomatics (CLPP), established in 2007 with the aim of representing a meeting point for all European psychiatrists working in this field. The Section promotes training and research initiatives throughout Europe, has promoted symposia and seminars during the EPA annual Congresses y as well as during other training initiatives in several European countries. On 31 December 2022, the Section was made up of fifty psychiatrists, from the following Countries: Armenia, Australia, Azerbaijan, Bangladesh, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Canada, Croatia, Egypt, Finland, Greece, India, Ireland, Italy, Pakistan, Norway, Peru, Poland, Portugal, Romania, South Africa, Sweden, Switzerland, Turkey, Ukraine, United Kingdom, United States.

Aim

Aim of this study was to assess the activity of psychiatrists working in the field of CLP throughout Europe during the CoViD-19 pandemic, and to identify specific work features associated with distress, as perceived by the professional.
